





LONDON SHOW FOR STUDENTS' ARTWORK



Artwork by Bulmershe students was on display recently at the *Totally Thames Festival* on London's Southbank. It was created as part of *Rivers of The World*, an international art and education project set up by the British Council and the Thames Festival Trust. It was also shown at last month's *Reading-on-Thames Festival*.

The project connects pupils around the globe to their local rivers through environmental, economic and cultural learning themes. Students across the world create artworks inspired by their research. Our students researched our local river, the Thames. Their theme was 'a resourceful river' and their artwork shows just how important the river is to nature and to the community that surrounds it.

The piece was made using a mixture of found imagery and students' own photographs to show the variety of resources that the river provides for nature and for us. This is presented using the human arm and the complex veins that mirror the complexity of the environment, which is ultimately in the hands of our community.

Rivers of the World is global project involving countries including Ethiopia, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, Vietnam, Zambia and Nepal. Along with Bulmershe and other schools in the Reading area, other UK schools in London, Southend and Hull took part.

In Art, students have completed an initial drawing to assess their prior knowledge and are now studying the Mexican festival of the Day of the Dead.

In English, students have been introduced to *Bookbuzz*, a reading programme from BookTrust that aims to help schools inspire a love of reading in Year 7 and 8 students.

Along with the Accelerated Reader programme, all our Year 7 students have now had the opportunity to choose their own book from a list suitable for 11 to 13-year-olds.

The books are all carefully selected by a panel of experts to ensure quality and suitability.

Y7 have also been heavily involved in extra-curricular activities, with recent strong performances in Cross Country and the boys rugby team.

From the Headteacher

We are delighted with our very positive start to the term; students have begun the new school year well prepared, well presented and ready to learn.

We are especially pleased with the way Year 7 have started their academic careers at Bulmershe with great confidence and enthusiasm. Our new students have made a very good impression in their first term.

Reflecting on our summer results, we were thrilled with both individual students' results and also departmental outcomes. For example our Maths results 72.8% 9-4, English 70.3% 9-4, Physics 96.8% A*-C, Chemistry 98.4% A*-C, Biology 93.7%, Computer Science 87.5%, Photography 86.7% and Art 94.1% A*-C - to name but a few.

We achieved tremendous results for sixth form, particularly at the higher grades of A* and A with 27.1% of all grades classed as A*/A and 47.1% of all grades at A*-B.

School reports are sent home next week and we are always keen to hear any feedback on our reporting systems, especially so at this time of change from GCSE grades A*-G to GCSE grades 9-1. Reports are accompanied by a feedback sheet: please do use this to help us improve our service or, if you prefer, contact school directly.

Our first Parents Forum is on Thursday 12 October, 6-7pm. The topic will be Pupil Premium and how we support the students that receive these additional funds. Thank you in advance to all parents that have already booked their place; these are valuable opportunities to meet staff and discuss school developments. Our next meeting is on Thursday 7 December, 6-7pm in our Sixth Form Centre. All parents are welcome.
