

Privacy Notice for students/parents/Carers (How we use student information)

This document provides insight into how information about pupils is used in our school.

The categories of student information that we collect, hold and share include:

- Personal information (such as name, address and parental contact details)
- Characteristics (such as ethnicity, language, nationality, country of birth and free school meal eligibility)
- Attendance information (such as sessions attended, number of absences and absence reasons)
- National Curriculum assessment and external examination results
- Relevant medical information
- Special Educational Needs information
- Exclusions/behavioural information
- Post 16 learning information
- CCTV images
- Biometric finger print algorithm

Why we collect and use this information

We use the student data:

- to support student learning
- to monitor and report on student progress
- to provide appropriate pastoral care
- to keep students safe and healthy
- to assess the quality of our services
- to comply with the law regarding data sharing
- to help you to decide what to do after you leave school
- to access food and refreshment in school canteen

The lawful basis on which we use this information

We collect and use student information under section 537A of the Education Act 1996, section 83 of the Children Act 1989 and The Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006 and subsequent amendments. We also comply with Article 6(1)(c) and Article 9(2)(b) of the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR)/Data Protection Act 2018 **[not yet in law]**.

Collecting student information

Whilst the majority of student information you provide to us is mandatory, some of it is provided to us on a voluntary basis. In order to comply with the General Data Protection Regulation/Data Protection Act 2018 **[not yet in law]**, we will inform you whether you are required to provide certain pupil information or if you have a choice.

Storing student data

We hold student data on local and cloud-based computer systems, as well as on paper. There are strict controls on who can see your information.

We hold your education records securely and retain them from your date of birth until you reach the age of 25, after which they are securely destroyed.

Who we share student information with

We routinely share pupil information with:

- schools that students attend after leaving us
- our Local Authority
- the Department for Education (DfE)
- services that support teaching, learning, assessment, safeguarding and school management
- catering services
- biometric providers
- online payment providers
- parental communications services
- health services
- providers of extra-curricular services such as music services, before/after school clubs (where the child/young person accesses these services)
- federations

Why we share student information

We only share information about students with others where the law and our policies allow us to, or where we have obtained any necessary consent. We will not share your data if you have advised us that you do not want it shared, unless it is the only way we can make sure you stay safe, or we are legally required to do so.

We share students data with the Department for Education (DfE) on a statutory basis. This data sharing underpins school funding and educational attainment policy and monitoring.

We are required to share information about our students with our Local Authority and the DfE under section 3 of The Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

Data collection requirements

Youth support services

Students aged 13+

Once our students reach the age of 13, we also pass student information to our Local Authority and / or provider of youth support services as they have responsibilities in relation to the education or training of 13-19 year olds under section 507B of the Education Act 1996.

This enables them to provide services as follows:

- youth support services
- careers advisers

A parent or guardian can request that **only** their child's name, address and date of birth is passed to their Local Authority or provider of youth support services by informing us. This right is transferred to the child / student once he/she reaches the age 16.

Pupils aged 16+

We will also share certain information about students aged 16+ with our Local Authority and / or provider of youth support services as they have responsibilities in relation to the education or training of 13-19 year olds under section 507B of the Education Act 1996. This enables them to provide services as follows:

- post-16 education and training providers
- youth support services
- careers advisers

The National Pupil Database (NPD)

The NPD is owned and managed by the Department for Education and contains information about pupils in schools in England. It provides invaluable evidence on educational performance to inform independent research, as well as studies commissioned by the Department. It is held in electronic format for statistical purposes. This information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, local authorities and awarding bodies.

We are required by law, to provide information about our students to the DfE as part of statutory data collections such as the school census and early years' census. Some of this information is then stored in the NPD. The law that allows this is the Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013. The DfE may share information about our pupils from the NPD with third parties who promote the education or well-being of children in England by:

- conducting research or analysis
- producing statistics
- providing information, advice or guidance

The DfE has robust processes in place to ensure the confidentiality of our data is maintained and there are stringent controls in place regarding access and use of the data. Decisions on whether DfE releases data to third parties are subject to a strict approval process and based on a detailed assessment of:

- who is requesting the data
- the purpose for which it is required
- the level and sensitivity of data requested: and
- the arrangements in place to store and handle the data

To be granted access to pupil information, organisations must comply with strict terms and conditions covering the confidentiality and handling of the data, security arrangements and retention and use of the data.

Requesting access to your personal data

Under data protection legislation, parents and students have the right to request access to information about them that we hold. To make a request for your personal information, or be given access to your child's educational record, please contact the school using the details at the end of this document.

You also have the right to:

- object to processing of personal data that is likely to cause, or is causing, damage or distress
- prevent processing for the purpose of direct marketing
- object to decisions being taken by automated means
- in certain circumstances, have inaccurate personal data rectified, blocked, erased or destroyed; and
- claim compensation for damages caused by a breach of the Data Protection regulations
